## 2019 Educators Book Award Winner

 GIEL. EWIMG Ghosts in the Schoolyard by Eve Ewing he closing of a neighborhood school is never easy and has a profound impact on the students, parents, and neighborhoods. It is often a gut-wrenching event that troubles the entire community. Captivating the reader with a strong narrative the author provides a close look at the closure of schools in the Bronzeville neighborhood of Chicago. In doing this she provides insights into all school closings and the effects on their communities. There is power in telling a story and she writes that she is telling " $a$ story rather than the story," leaving the reader with a deeper understanding of the issues. The story reads much like a novel yet it has end notes, a bibliography, and a discussion of her research methodology.

Eve Ewing writes, "What is the history that has brought us to this moment?" This describes well her analysis of the events. The reader will be touched by the story and leave with new insights into the deep roots of racism and poverty. While at first glance this book appeared to have appeal to a limited number, it actually is an indepth analysis of one event which has broad implications.
